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### 50 YEARS AGO: INSURANCE COMPANIES THROW IN THE TOWEL, AND THE ATLANTIC COAST IS ABANDONED.

Fifty years ago, the planet experienced a cataclysmic event that marked our history: a giant tsunami that devastated coastlines worldwide, triggered by the massive collapse of ice caps from Antarctica and Greenland into the ocean, a direct consequence of climate change.

Scientists had long warned that climate change had devastating consequences for our planet, and what happened in 2070 was a sad example. The fall of giant ice blocks into the ocean created titanic waves that rapidly spread across the coasts, engulfing entire cities and causing unprecedented damage (page 13).



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# The Coastal Sentinels: 50 years ago, environmental activism was transforming the coastlines

In the 2070s, coastal areas became the battleground for a fierce ecological struggle. Climate activists formed a powerful lobby, advocating for the restoration of the coasts to their "natural" state, but this quest took a controversial and often violent turn.

Passionate speeches and bold actions garnered international attention, creating considerable political pressure for significant changes. Charismatic political figures emerged from this movement, using their platform to demand strict regulations and the protection of coastal areas, creating a political landslide in favor of restoring the coasts to their natural state (page 4).



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#### From the Unexpected Exodus to Coastal Renaissance: Impacts of the Great Displacement

The winds of climate change have reshaped the face of France, giving rise to an unprecedented exodus from the Eastern regions towards the Western coasts. The exile of populations from the Eastern regions, rendered inhospitable due to global warming, resulted in a massive migration towards the coastal areas of the West, beginning in 2070. This demographic transformation has brought about significant changes in coastal cities, transforming once tranquil places into bustling centers of activity (page 5).



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## In response to the Maritime Crisis of 2070, the coastlines reinvented themselves.

Fifty years ago, the shores of the sea were struck by an unprecedented environmental collapse, initiating a profound transformation of coastal areas. Confronted with this cataclysm, coastal societies had to reinvent themselves. Innovative water management projects emerged, ranging from the construction of dikes and artificial reefs to the restoration of coastal ecosystems. Renewable energies were developed to reduce environmental impact and ensure long-term resilience. Communities learned to cultivate climate-resistant crops and raise species adapted to the new environmental conditions. Ancestral techniques and scientific innovations merged to ensure food security (page 4).
